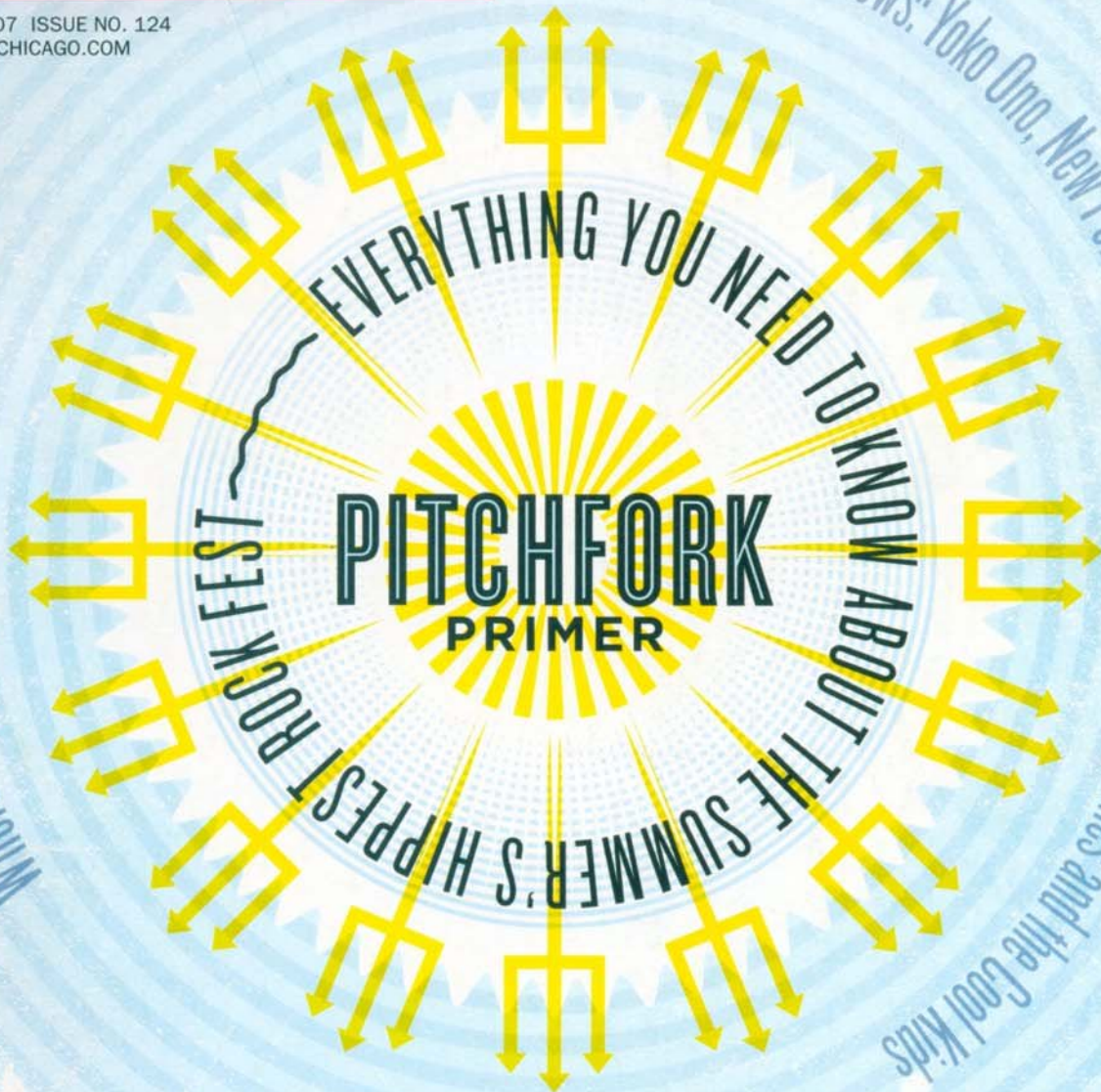

What are some good dress shirts for skinny men? Everything I try on is too blousey around the waistline.—Ben S., Uptown

It doesn't matter what size you are—finding the perfect fit in clothing is important to everyone. Luckily for our thin friends, there are some good slim-fitting options. The **Hugo Boss Red Line** includes a nice dress shirt that has a slim cut, but won't look too tight, so it can be appropriate for work. We found this one at **His Stuff** (5314 N Clark St, 773-989-9111) for \$145. The **Thomas Pink boutique** located within Macy's (111 N State St, 312-781-3525) has plenty of shirts (\$89–\$175) that are cut small enough so they won't blouse out at the waist and the upper arms. The shop clerks there will even take the extra time and help you with measurements to make sure you get the right shirt. The sizes at **H&M** (locations around the city, hm.com) usually run a little small, thanks to the store's Swedish roots. If you're looking for a cheaper option (usually under \$30), that's the way to go. And finally, if you just don't have time to shop around from store to store, visit tailoredshirts.com. The site



allows you to design your own custom-made dress shirt (\$79–\$125) and the shipping is free. —KA

DALEY FASHION DOSE For Loop clockwatchers, lunchtime shopping options are usually limited to a quick look at Macy's or one of the other ubiquitous chain stores that dominate State Street and Michigan Avenue. But before you board the next train to a neighborhood boutique and risk a three-hour lunch your boss wouldn't approve of, consider the **Chicago Sidewalk Sale** on Wednesday 18. The event brings about two dozen designers to Daley Plaza. Featured items include summer shoes (pictured, top) by Annie Mohaupt of Mohop and feather earrings (pictured, bottom) from Aya-Nikole Cook of Haji Couture. Other stylish booths worth checking out are the rock-inspired looks of 426 Brand, Kathryn Kerrigan's big foot-friendly kicks, and Festa Stuff, known for its localized "312 Forever" and "Wrigleyville Girl" tees.
